
Due to the uncertainty of Minnesota winter weather, scheduled activity outings will depend on road conditions. We will try to inform residents as soon as possible of cancellations.

The More You Know

WHEN TO THINK ABOUT ASSISTED LIVING

Often a resident will call because they are concerned for a neighbor. They are trying to help the neighbor as much as they can, but they feel more help is needed. When I chat with the neighbor, they feel they are doing ok because they have lots of help.

So now I have a helper calling for help and the neighbor not realizing how their needs are impacting others. Being an occasional help is one thing, but it can turn into becoming a caregiver, which has risks of its own.

If you are not medically qualified, problems can arise. For example, we had a resident setting up medications for a neighbor. Unfortunately, there were some medication errors that sent the neighbor to the hospital a few times. There was a change in medication, but the helper wasn't aware of the change. They also weren't aware of a drug interaction.

Many would benefit from assisted living but have a dismal perception of what it is. So, what is assisted living?

Assisted living doesn't mean all your independence is taken away. In fact, we encourage independence.

Assisted living is a good option if you can manage your own care but need occasional help.

The Commons is a smaller building, which makes it easier for residents to get from place to place. Why does that matter? You spend less energy getting from point A to B and save your energy to enjoy what you went there for.

The assisted living team will create a care plan WITH you that meets your individual needs, even if those needs change over time.

Basic services assisted living provides/offers:

- Housekeeping assistance every week included with the rent
- Escorts (walking program)
- Help with personal cares
- Help managing medications
- 24-hour staff
- Built in daily check-ins
- Three meals a day

Please give me a call if you have questions or would like to tour assisted living.

If you live at Shorewood Place, unfortunately, we do not offer any type of nursing or daily check-ins due to our licensing requirements. If you feel you need a little help (for example getting in and out of the shower or medication management), there are outside care agencies that could help you. ONLY YOU CAN HELP PREVENT APARTMENT FIRES!

In apartment buildings such as Shorewood, there is an escalated fire risk. Someone may forget they put something on the stove/oven and leave the apartment or fall asleep while waiting for their dinner to cook. There are many scenarios, even an overloaded extension cord is a fire hazard.

Each apartment entrance door is fire rated. That means should there be a fire outside your apartment, your door will keep you safe for at least 45 minutes. That's long enough for the fire to be extinguished or the fire department to evacuate you. Maintaining the fire door is essential. For example, putting a nail or screw in your apartment door can, and most likely will, void the label on the fire door and affect its performance under fire conditions.

Fire risk increases when using extension cords or splitters (multiple wall plug ins). These items can easily be overloaded and with no warning at all, overheat and start a fire. In Assisted Living, extension cords and splitters are no longer allowed per the Fire Marshall. We are asking to please replace those with a power strip with a switch. Power strips come with a circuit breaker as a precautionary measure in case a short circuit or power overload happens. In some modern designs, power strips may have an automatic shut-off feature when the device or appliance remains unused for a number of hours.

For the sprinklers in your apartment to work the way they are supposed to make, sure there is at minimum clearance of 18 inches. Reorganize the shelves in your closet or wherever you have a sprinkler close by to give enough space around the sprinklers. The sprinklers need room to sprinkle!




